Wisconsin Historical Newspaper Portal

The Wisconsin Public Library Consortium (WPLC), Wisconsin Historical Society (WHS), Wisconsin Newspaper Association (WNA), and Recollection Wisconsin are working together to provide digital access to Wisconsin's historical newspapers. A pilot set of content from eleven communities across the state will be available through the Wisconsin Newspaper Association Digital Research Site in BadgerLink (http://badgerlink.newsmemory.com/wna/badgerlink/) in early 2016. Funding for the pilot project is provided by WPLC as well as Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funds awarded to the Wisconsin Department of Public Instruction by the Federal Institute of Museum and Library Services.

Thinking about digitizing your library's newspapers? Benefits of working with this collaborative statewide project include:

- WHS will scan its master microfilm negatives, which provide a cleaner, more readable
 digital version than microfilm that may be scratched and worn from years or decades of
 patron use. WHS has the second largest collection of microfilmed newspapers in the
 United States, surpassed only by the Library of Congress, including hundreds of daily
 and weekly titles from Wisconsin communities.
- WNA will coordinate with newspaper publishers on behalf of libraries to secure permissions to add copyrighted content (publication date 1923 or later) to the research portal. WNA is the professional association for the state's newspaper publishers, serving 222 member newspapers.
- Access to the full-text searchable digitized historical newspapers will be provided through BadgerLink authentication, freely available to all Wisconsin public library cardholders. Access for out-of-state researchers is currently under investigation.

How can my library participate?

- 1) Check the WHS microfilm catalog (http://www.wisconsinhistory.org/microfilm/search.asp) to see if your community's newspapers are part of WHS's microfilm holdings. Contact microfilmsales@wisconsinhistory.org if you can't find your community's newspapers in the online catalog, or if you have any other questions about microfilm holdings at WHS. If your library has print copies of daily or weekly community newspapers that are not available on microfilm, WHS is interested in hearing from you, and may be able to microfilm the print copies.
- 2) Consider your priorities for digital access. Are there specific titles or date ranges that are heavily used or in high demand by researchers?

What if we've already had our newspapers scanned?

It may be possible to add existing digitized historical newspapers to the portal. Files will need to be renamed according to WNA requirements and file splitting or other reformatting may also be necessary.
